- Reproductive Justice (RJ) encompasses a woman's human right to:
  - Decide if and when she will have a baby and the conditions under which she will give birth.
  - Decide if she will not have a baby and her options for preventing or ending a pregnancy.
  - Parent the children she already has with the necessary social supports in safe environments and sustainable communities.

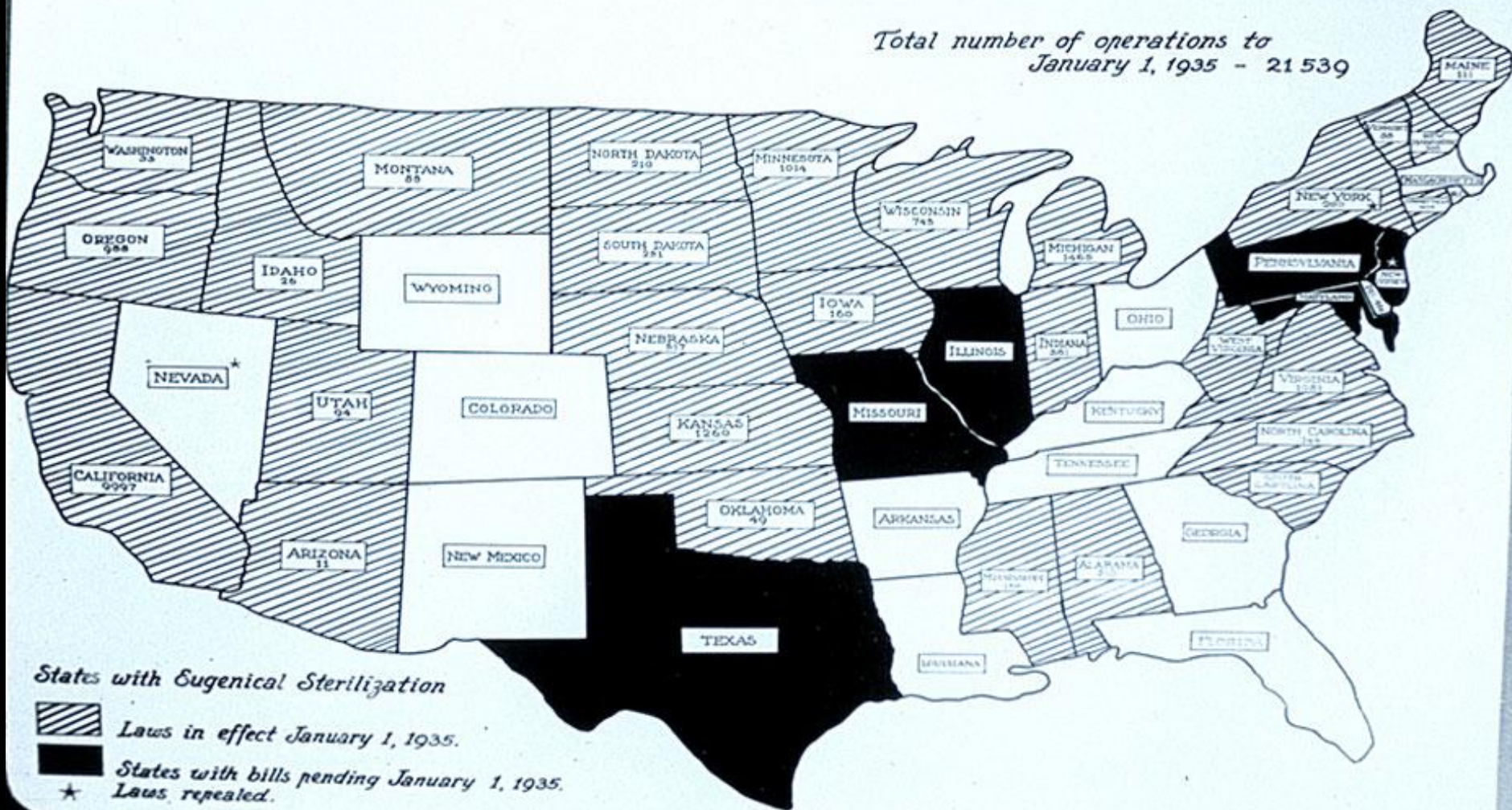
An estimated 300,000 people, in one of the largest political demonstrations ever in Washington, marched on the U.S. Capitol yesterday demanding preservation of a 1973 Supreme Court decision granting women rights to legal abortions. Jammed elbow-to-elbow, blowing whistles, beating drums and waving banners, the marchers packed a mile-long stretch of Constitution Avenue NW in a parade that continued more than four hours before the last of them arrived on Capitol Hill from the site of a morning rally at the Washington Monument. The crowd -- a mix of grandmothers, civil rights activists, college students, homemakers and religious congregations energized by a pending challenge to abortion rights -- far surpassed organizers' early hopes and dwarfed a few hundred counterdemonstrators. "It is time for Congress to understand we are the majority," said Molly Yard, president of the National Organization for Women, which coordinated the march. "This is the biggest march for women's rights in the history of the country." Eleanor Smeal, president of the Fund for the Feminist Majority, declared the battle over abortion "a whole new ballgame." "We've hit middle America," she said. "I can't get over it." Billed as a watershed in the escalating abortion dispute, the demonstration on the cool, blustery day was intended by its organizers as a way to influence

# State Regulation of Procreation

- *Meyer v. Nebraska & Prince v. Massachusetts*
  - Right to care, custody and control of minor children.
- *Skinner v. Oklahoma*
  - Right to procreate.
- *Griswold v. Connecticut & Eisenstadt v. Baird*
  - Right to access birth control for married and single people.
- *Roe v. Wade & Planned Parenthood v. Casey*
  - Right to abortion.

# *Roe v. Wade*

- Fundamental right to an abortion.
- A fetus is not a Constitutional person.
- State has an interest in potential life .
  - The Court does not define what it means by potential life.
- Trimester Framework
  - 1st - No regulation
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> - Regulate to protect the health of the pregnant woman
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> - Can go so far as to ban but **must** have an exception for the life or health of the pregnant woman.

# The *Casey* Court

## 5-4 DECISION FOR PLANNED PARENTHOOD OF SOUTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA

Relying on a new "undue burden" standard to assess abortion restrictions, a deeply divided bench upheld all but one of several Pennsylvania restrictions



# *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* (1992)

- Court upholds Constitutional right to abortion.
- Determines that *Roe* did not give enough weight to the State interest in potential life.
- State has an interest in potential life from the start of a pregnancy.
- Rejects trimester framework and replaces it with the viability line.
- State could not require spousal consent, but could require parental notification for minors (with judicial bypass), waiting periods, and state scripted informed consent.

# *Roe & Casey Taken Together*

The right to privacy is broad enough to encompass a woman's right to determine whether to terminate her pregnancy.

A fetus is not a constitutional person.

No bans before fetal viability.

Any bans must include an exception for life and health of the pregnant person.

No spousal notification or consent.

Minors can be required to notify or get consent from parents or guardians before having an abortion but only if there is a judicial bypass option.

# *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health (2022)*

- *Roe & Casey* overruled
  - No constitutional right to abortion because
    - Not enumerated in the Constitution;
    - Not deeply rooted in the Nation's history and traditions;
    - Stare decisis doesn't count.
  - Decision is limited to abortion because other privacy rights do not involve “potential life.”

# Abortion in the U.S.

(Data collected in the year before *Dobbs*)

- Among people obtaining an abortion, nearly two-thirds were in their 20s: 33% were aged 20–24 and 28% were 25–29.
- Adolescents made up 10% of people obtaining an abortion; 2% of people obtaining an abortion were 17 or younger.
- Similar proportions of people obtaining an abortion were Black (29%), Latinx (30%) or non-Hispanic White (30%). Four percent were Asian and 7% identified as another race or ethnicity or as more than one race.
- Some 41% of people obtaining abortions had an income below the federal poverty level (FPL) and 30% had incomes between 100% and 199% of the FPL.
- Approximately 55% of people who obtained an abortion had previously had at least one birth.
- Approximately one in four women are expected to have an abortion by age 45, given 2020 abortion rates.

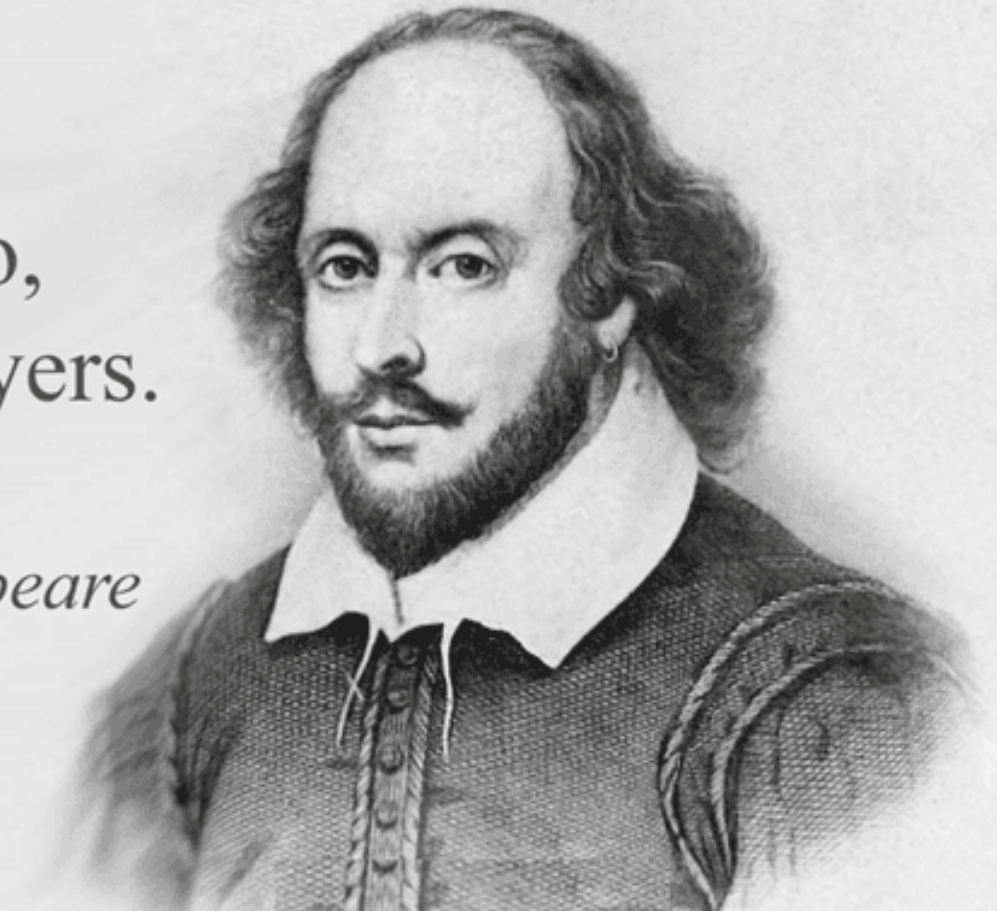

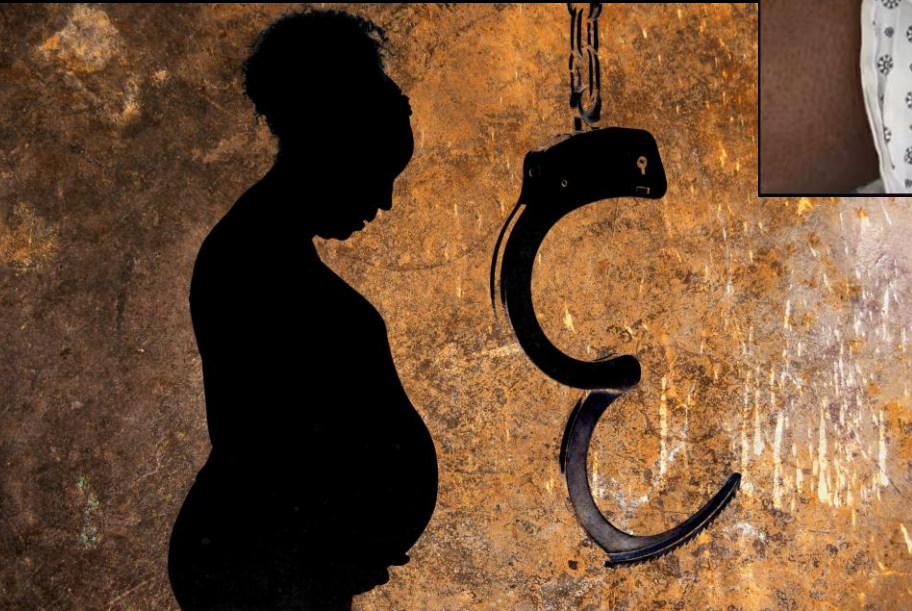
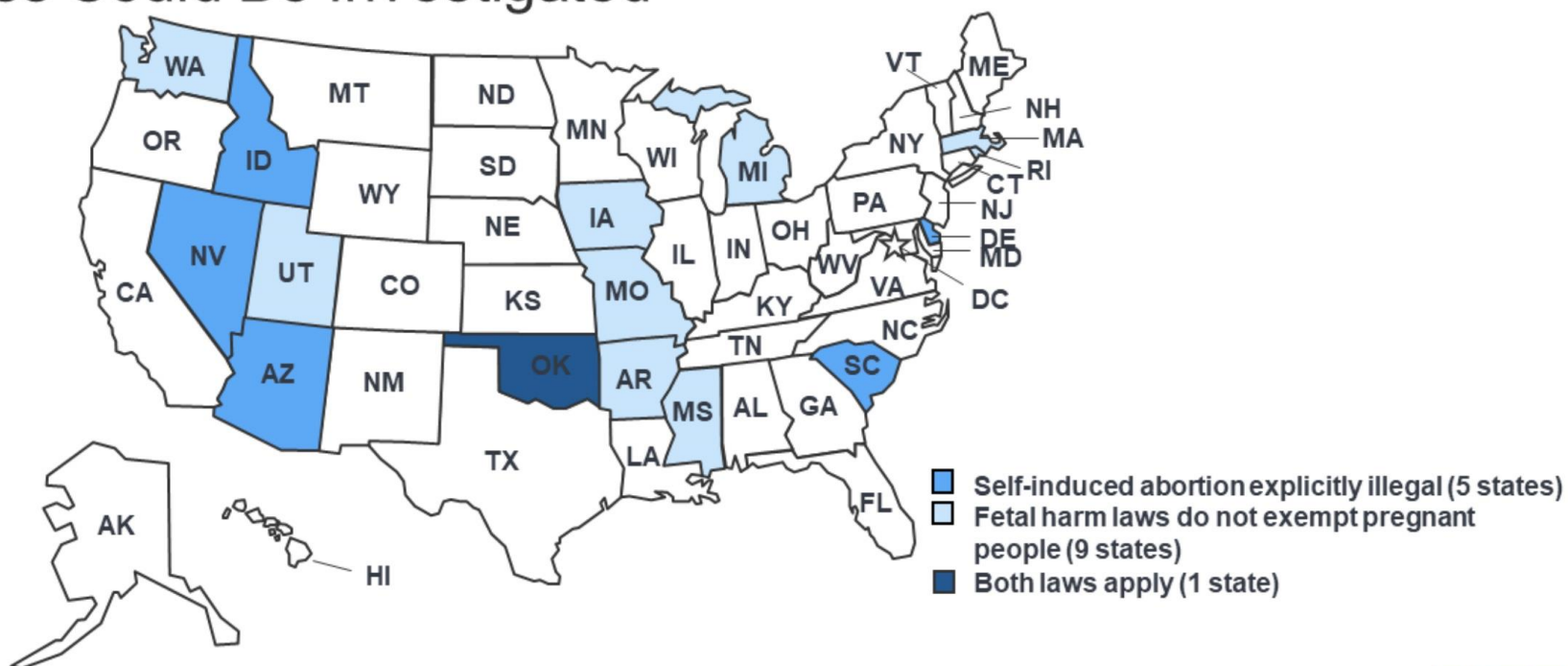

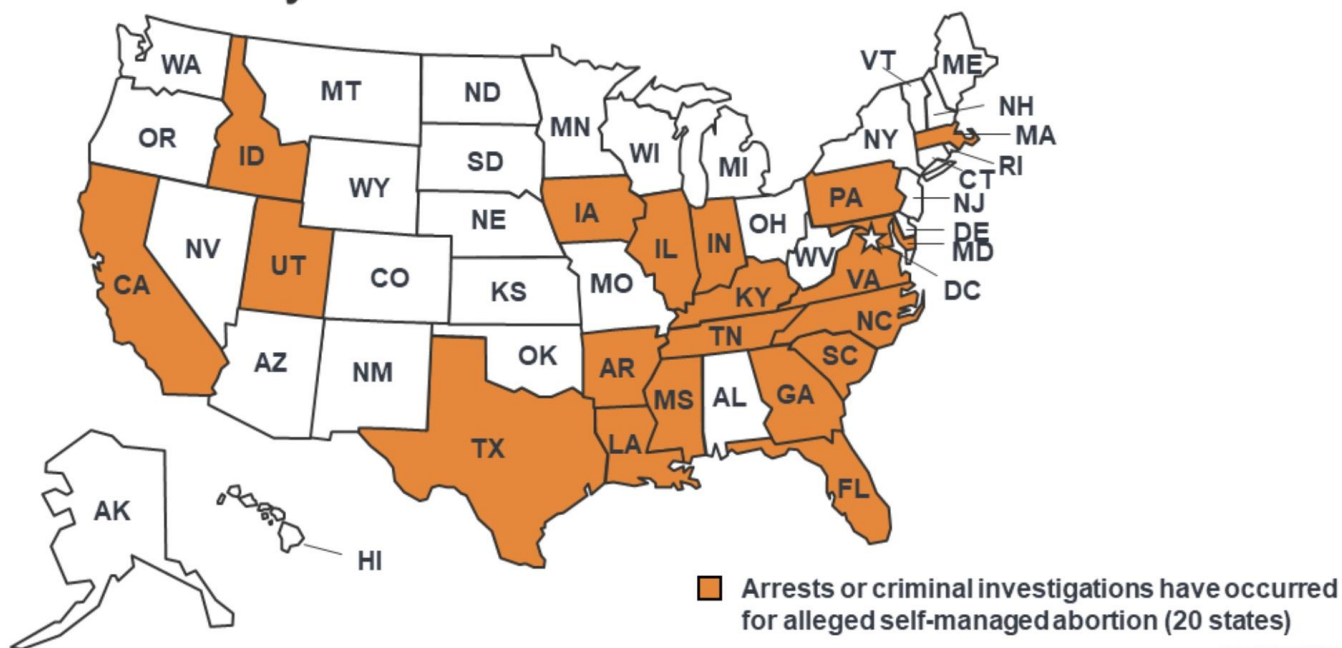
## Criminalization of Self-Managed Abortion Means Pregnancy Loss Could Be Investigated

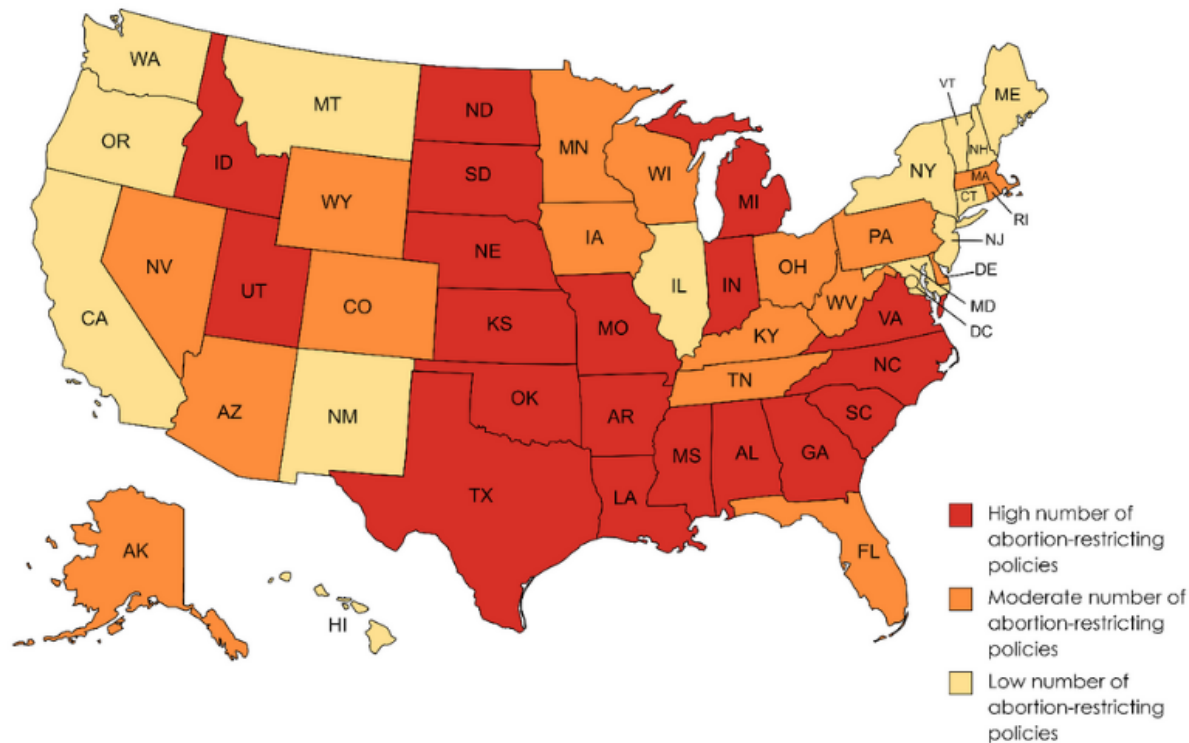

Family is a basic human right.

Infertility is recognized as a disease by the World Health Organization and the American Medical Association, among others. In the United States, as in many other countries, economic, racial, ethnic, geographic, and other disparities affect both access to fertility treatment and treatment outcomes.

Disparities are the chief contributors to disparities in access to effective treatment; however, social and cultural factors as well, including individual or systemic discrimination that disadvantages certain people because of their race, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Research is needed and encouraged to understand documented racial and ethnic disparities in treatment success and to attempt methods to reduce those disparities.

Responsibility of all those providing reproductive and infertility care, including assisted reproductive technology, such as policy makers, and insurance providers, to actively and deliberately address and lessen the barriers to infertility treatment should include increasing insurance coverage, reducing the economic and noneconomic burdens of treatment, increasing public and physician attention to treatment disparities, and reaching and educating underserved populations in underserved areas.

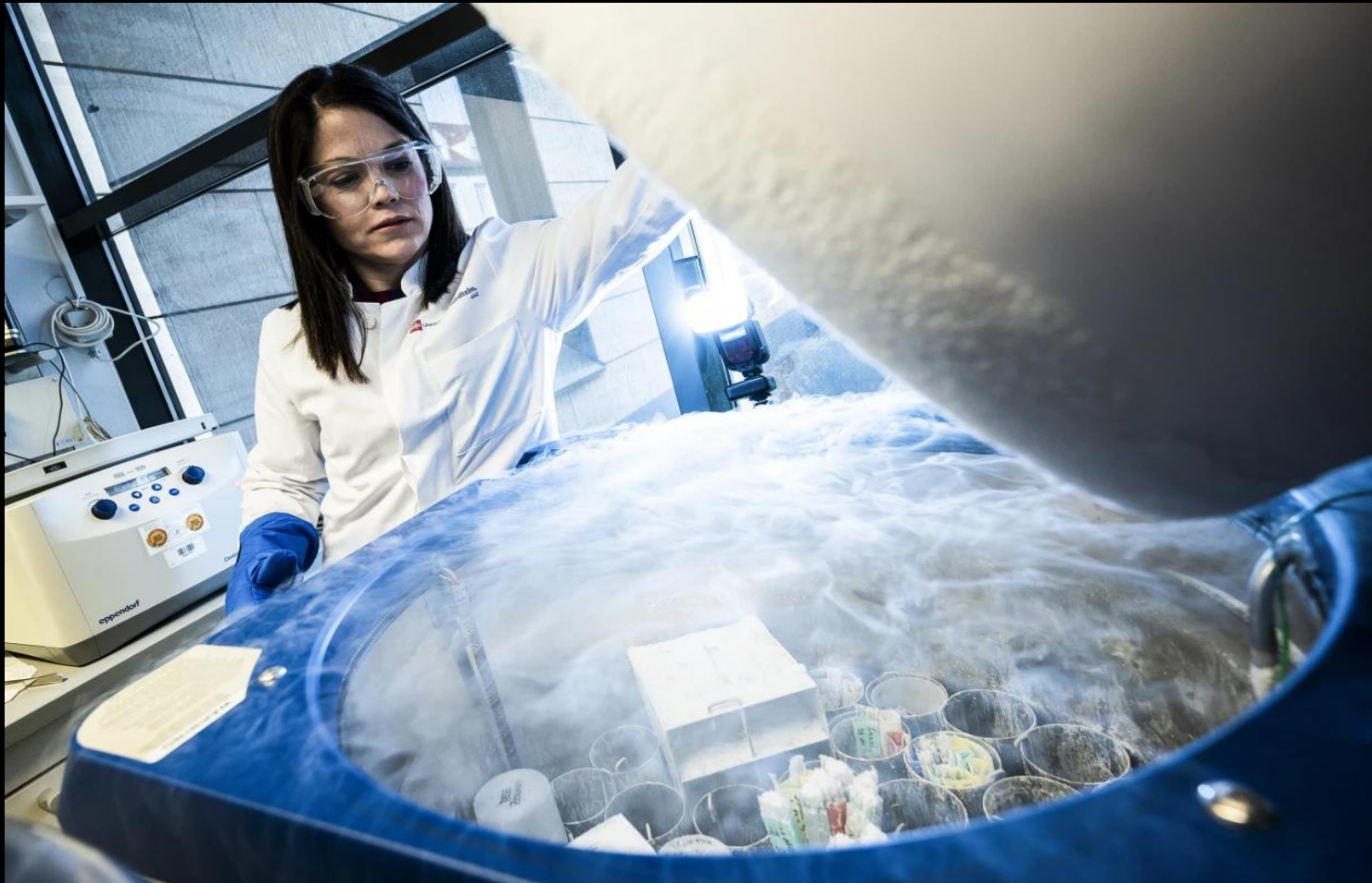

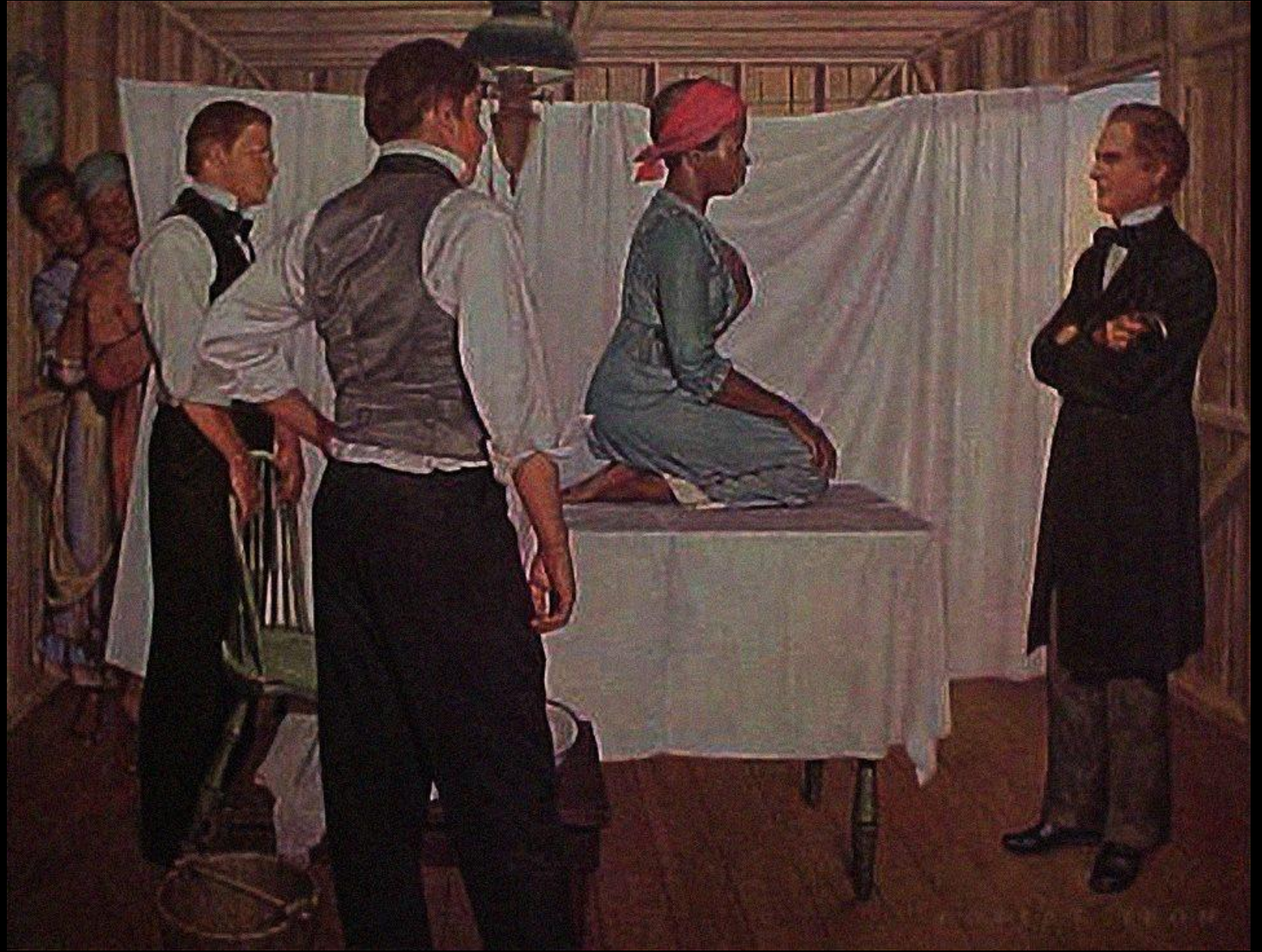

# *LePage v. Center for Reproductive Medicine*

- “The People of Alabama have declared the public policy of this State to be that unborn human life is sacred. We believe that each human being, from the moment of conception, is made in the image of God, created by Him to reflect His likeness. It is as if the People of Alabama took what was spoken of the prophet Jeremiah and applied it to every unborn person in this state: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, Before you were born I sanctified you." Jeremiah 1:5 (NKJV 1982). All three branches of government are subject to a constitutional mandate to treat each unborn human life with reverence. Carving out an exception for the people in this case, small as they were, would be unacceptable to the People of this State, who have required us to treat every human being in accordance with the fear of a holy God who made them in His image.”

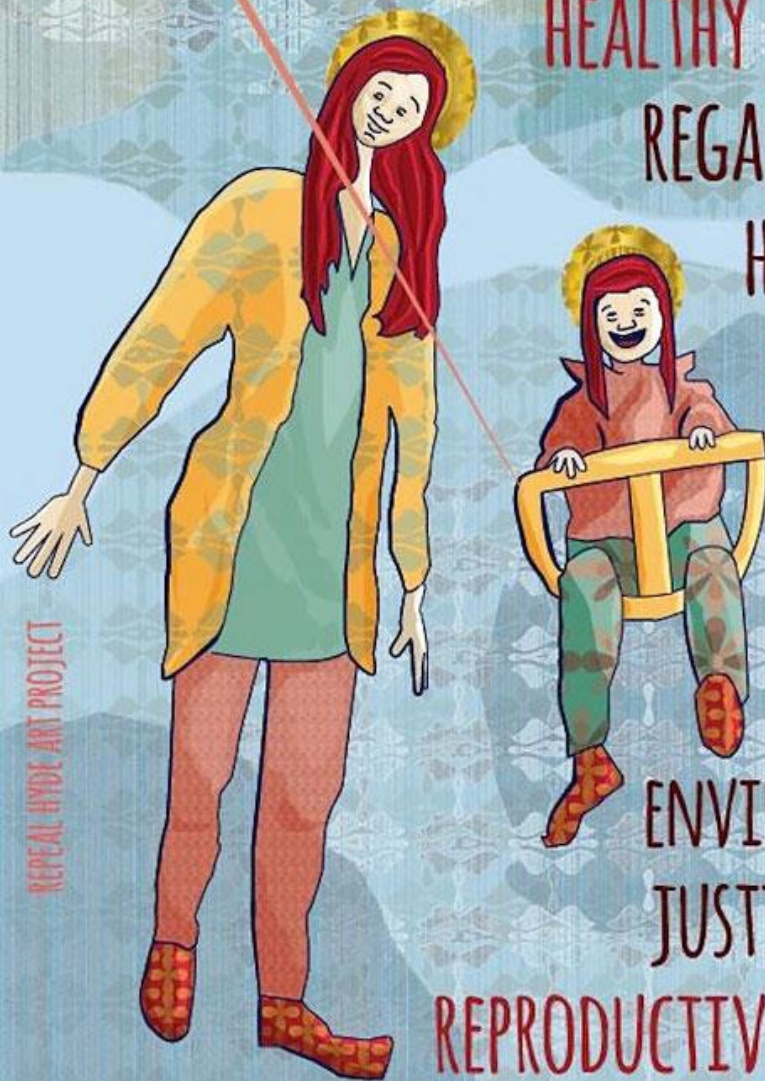

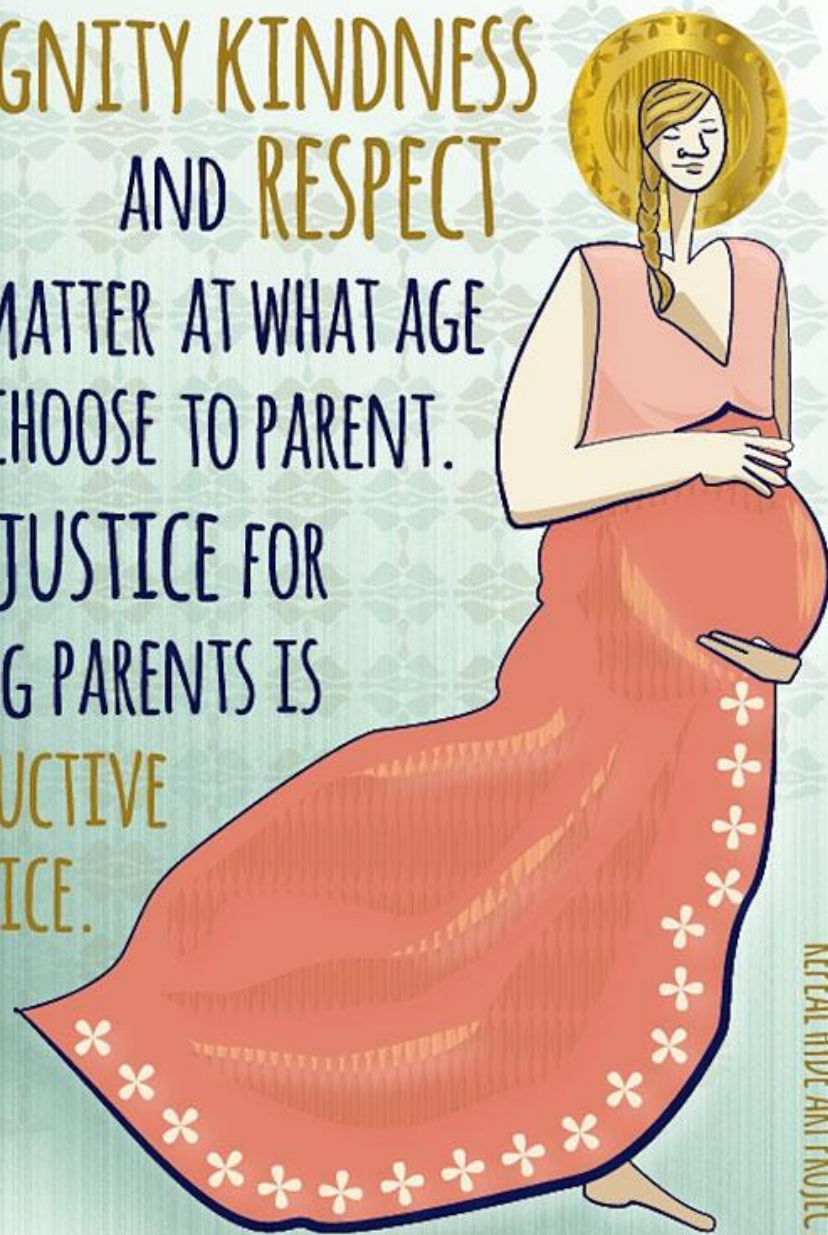

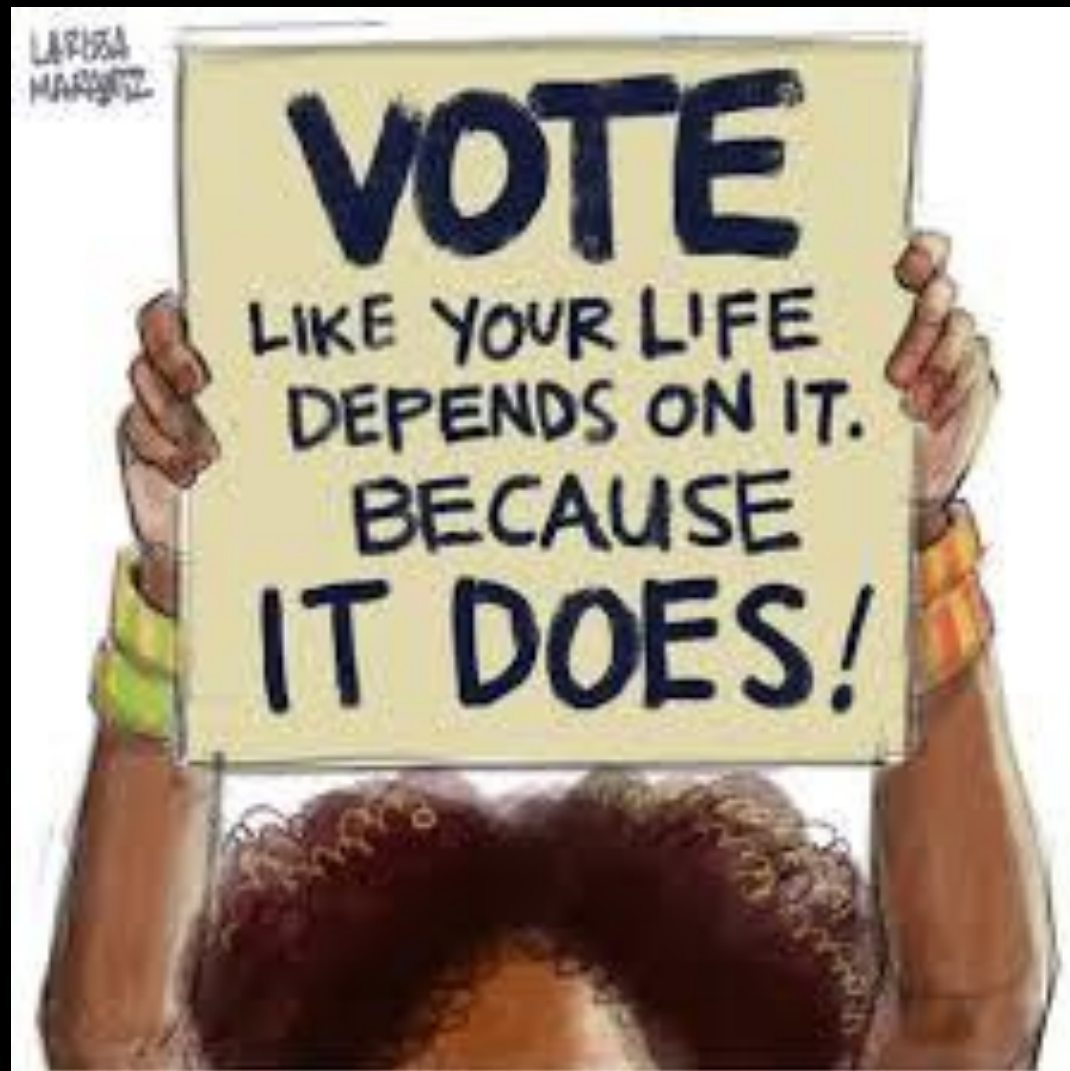
